
## SCIENTIFIC OBITUARY FOR PROFESSOR DAVID TURNOCK



Among contemporary geographers interested on most of Romanian areas, but also on Eastern Europe in general, **Professor dr. David Turnock** was internationally known by his numerous studies in the field of Human Geography.

Born in 1938, Professor David Turnock was educated at Wigan Grammar School. After completing two years of national service, he studied at St Catharine's College, Cambridge, where he was eventually awarded a doctorate. He went on to work at the University of Aberdeen for three years and then moved to Leicester in 1969 where Professor Turnock spent the remainder of his career, working for 34 years until he retired in 2003. Professor Turnock's desire to research and publish was a constant throughout his life. During his fruitful career professor Turnock published hundreds of papers and more than 20 books. His contributions to European understanding were recognised by the Royal Geographical Society, which presented him with the Edward Heath Award in 1989.

Because of his special relation with the Romanian geography, in the year 2000 he was granted *Doctor Honoris Causa* of the West University of Timisoara and in 2009 he

was also awarded with the same academic title by 'Al. I. Cuza' University from Iasi. Besides his research and teaching activities, Professor Turnock led charitable efforts to collect books to restock university libraries in the former communist states, most notably that of the University of Bucharest. He also helped to deliver medical supplies and toys to villages throughout Romania. On January 2006 he honoured us by accepting to be one of the foundingmembers of the Scientific Committee of the Review of Historical Geography and Toponomastics.

Professor David Turnock died on 10 May 2011 after a car accident.
